In a very real sense, the Bible serves as the "instruction manual" for life. The Creator of our existence has outlined standards, plans, and purposes for us within its pages. Without studying the contents of this "instruction manual", we remain oblivious to His intentions and lack the guidance to live according to His design.

Unfortunately, many individuals don't give much effort in exploring the depths of the Bible. Sometimes, this stems from laziness or misplaced priorities, or just struggling to understand the text they are reading. Its true, the Bible can prove challenging to understand at times. And while its foundational teachings can be understood by children, numerous aspects within its pages demand additional effort and guidance.

If you want to get the most out of the Bible, you need to learn how to read and interpret it for yourself.

We hope this journal will help you do just that. This journal was created to help you get the most out of your biblical reading and study as you tap into the eternal truths God reveals to us throughout Scripture. And to help you create a plan and habit of reading the Bible on a regular basis.

#### KEYS FOR YOUR READING

Using the acronym TAP, we have created key sections in this journal to help you tap into God's truth.

#### Truth

In our exploration of the Bible, it's crucial to stay attuned to the main themes and essential teachings, while avoiding getting too sidetracked by secondary matters. It's like peering through a telescope to see the big picture before delving into the details with a microscope. The Bible isn't a riddle book or a coded message, so there's no need to search for intricate symbols and hidden meanings. Instead, focus on what it meant to the original readers and how those insights apply to your life today. In doing so, you unveil the timeless truths that God desires for us to grasp.

#### Application

The ultimate goal of reading and studying the Bible is not to showcase theological expertise or engage in intellectual debates, but rather to apply its teachings to our everyday lives. Bible study is not about impressing others; it's about allowing God's Word to bring about a transformative impact. So, as you read the Bible, listen to the Holy Spirit attentively—and then respond with obedience. With that in mind, as we read the Scriptures, we should do it with humility and an open heart, prepared to be both challenged and changed by God's truths. An open-minded attitude is key. Let go of preconceptions, assumptions, and prior knowledge. Embrace the potential for fresh revelations each time you engage with the Bible. Its pages are a wellspring of inexhaustible truths.

#### **OVERVIEW**

The Gospel of Matthew, though not explicitly naming its author, has been attributed to Matthew, one of Jesus' twelve disciples. Early church fathers affirmed Matthew's authorship and the earliest manuscripts bear his name. The Gospel of Matthew is the first book of the New Testament. Matthew's Gospel emphasizes Jesus as the promised Messiah and connects his life and teachings with the fulfillment of Old Testament prophecies.

This Gospel focuses on presenting Jesus as the Son of God and Savior of the world, emphasizing themes such as faith, forgiveness, love, compassion, and the establishment of the kingdom of God. Overall, the Gospel of Matthew presents a comprehensive account of Jesus' life and teachings, emphasizing his role as the Messiah and inviting readers to follow him in faith and discipleship.



#### Context

Matthew 1 is the first chapter of the Gospel of Matthew in the New Testament of the Bible. It begins with the genealogy of Jesus Christ, tracing his ancestry back to Abraham through his earthly father, Joseph. The chapter highlights the importance of Jesus as the fulfillment of Old Testament prophecies and God's promises to his people. It also emphasizes the divine nature of Jesus as the Son of God and the Savior of the world. Overall, Matthew 1 sets the stage for the birth and mission of Jesus Christ as the Messiah.

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#### Context

After being warned in a dream, the Magi return home by a different route to avoid Herod. Meanwhile, Joseph is also warned in a dream to flee to Egypt with Mary and Jesus to escape Herod's wrath. This event fulfills the prophecy that Jesus would be called out of Egypt. Herod, realizing he has been outwitted by the Magi, orders the massacre of all male infants in Bethlehem as a desperate attempt to eliminate Jesus. However, Jesus and his family safely return to Israel after Herod's death and settle in the town of Nazareth, fulfilling another prophecy. The chapter highlights Jesus as the promised Messiah and the fulfillment of Old Testament prophecies.




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# DAY 3 MATTHEW 3

#### Context


Matthew 3 takes place in the region of Judea and the Jordan River, where John the Baptist is preaching and baptizing people as a sign of repentance in preparation for the arrival of the Messiah. The chapter serves as an introduction to the public ministry of Jesus by showing his baptism by John and the affirmation from God as his Son. John's preaching and Jesus' baptism were significant events that signaled the beginning of a new era of salvation and redemption for humanity.



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#### Context

Immediately following the baptism of Jesus by John the Baptist in chapter 3, Jesus is led by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil for forty days and nights. This testing mirrors the Israelites' 40 years of wandering in the desert and shows Jesus overcoming temptation and affirming his identity and mission as the Son of God. Upon completing his time in the wilderness, Jesus begins his ministry in Galilee, preaching the kingdom of heaven, healing the sick, and performing miracles to demonstrate his authority and power as the promised Messiah. He calls his first disciples, Simon Peter, Andrew, James, and John, who leave their livelihoods to follow him. This chapter sets the stage for the teaching and ministry of Jesus as he proclaims the message of repentance, the kingdom of heaven, and the fulfillment of God's promises through him.



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#### Context

Matthew 5, often referred to as the Sermon on the Mount, is a key passage in the Gospel of Matthew that contains some of Jesus' most well-known teachings. In this chapter, Jesus delivers a sermon on a hillside, outlining the principles of the kingdom of God and the attitudes and behaviors expected of his followers. Jesus begins by pronouncing blessings upon the poor in spirit, the mourners, the meek, and those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, among others. He then teaches about the importance of being salt and light in the world, keeping the commandments, and avoiding anger.



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#### **MATTHEW 5:27-48**

#### Context

Jesus continues his teachings in the Sermon on the Mount and addresses various topics related to personal conduct and relationships. Jesus speaks about the issues of adultery, lust, divorce, oaths, retaliation, and loving one's enemies. He also emphasizes the sanctity of marriage and discourages divorce except in cases of infidelity. Additionally, Jesus teaches about the importance of keeping one's word and speaking truthfully, cautioning against making oaths lightly. He also challenges his followers to show love and forgiveness even to their enemies, as this reflects the character of God. This passage explores how individuals should conduct themselves in their personal relationships and interactions with others, emphasizing the importance of integrity, faithfulness, and showing love and grace to all, even those who may wrong them.

# DAY 8 MATTHEW 6:1-18

#### **Context**

Matthew 6 continues the Sermon on the Mount, where Jesus further teaches his disciples about righteousness, piety, and the kingdom of God. In these verses, Jesus focuses on the practices of giving to the needy, prayer, and fasting, emphasizing the importance of doing these acts with sincerity and humility rather than seeking attention or praise from others. #### Context




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#### MATTHEW 7:15-29




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#### **MATTHEW 8:1-17**

Upon reaching the other side of the lake, Jesus encounters two demonpossessed men who are causing havoc in the region. Jesus casts the demons out of the men and into a nearby herd of pigs, leading to the pigs jumping into the lake and drowning. When the local people heard what happened, they were afraid and asked Jesus to leave their region. Overall, this passage highlights Jesus' authority over nature, demons, and sickness, and demonstrates his willingness to bring healing and freedom to those who seek him. It also shows how some respond to Jesus with fear and rejection, while others are amazed at his power and follow him.



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### **MATTHEW 9:1-17**

#### Context

Matthew 9 continues to illustrate the miraculous power and compassion of Jesus through a series of healings and interactions with various individuals. The chapter begins with Jesus healing a paralyzed man and forgiving his sins, demonstrating his authority to forgive sins and perform physical healings. 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#### MATTHEW 10:1-25

Matthew 10 consists of Jesus commissioning and sending out his twelve disciples to preach the message of the kingdom of God, perform miracles, and reach out to the lost sheep of Israel. In this chapter, Jesus warns the disciples of the challenges they will face, including persecution and rejection, but reassures them of God's provision and care for them. He encourages them to trust in the Holy Spirit for guidance and strength as they proclaim the message of salvation.




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#### MATTHEW 10:26-42




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#### MATTHEW 11:1-19

#### Context



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

### MATTHEW 12:1-21

#### Context

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### MATTHEW 12:22-37

#### Context

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### MATTHEW 12:38-50

#### **Context**

In Matthew 12:38-50, some of the scribes and Pharisees ask Jesus for a sign to prove his authority. Jesus responds by telling them that the only sign he will give them is the sign of Jonah, referring to his death and resurrection. Jesus then teaches about the importance of recognizing and following his teachings. He compares those who do the will of his Father in heaven to his true family, emphasizing that spiritual loyalty to God is more important than familial ties. This passage emphasizes the importance of faith, obedience, and sincerity in following Jesus, and the need to align one's actions with the teachings of God rather than relying on outward displays or seeking signs. Jesus challenges his listeners to truly seek God's will and commit their lives to following Him wholeheartedly.




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#### MATTHEW 13:1-23

#### Context

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### MATTHEW 13:24-43

#### Context

The parable illustrates the coexistence of believers and unbelievers in the world, symbolizing the presence of good and evil. Jesus later explains the meaning of the parable, highlighting that the Son of Man will send his angels to separate the righteous from the wicked at the end of the age. This passage teaches about the ultimate separation of believers and unbelievers and emphasizes the final judgment when God will establish his kingdom and reward the righteous. Jesus encourages his followers to remain faithful and trust in God's ultimate justice and sovereignty over all things.



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### MATTHEW 13:44-58

#### Context

In Matthew 13:44-58, Jesus shares three parables that illustrate the immeasurable value of the Kingdom of Heaven. The Parable of the Hidden Treasure and the Pearl of Great Value both emphasize the joy and sacrifice involved when someone discovers the kingdom and values it above all else. The Parable of the Net describes the final judgment, where the righteous and the wicked will be separated. At the end of the chapter, Jesus returns to His hometown of Nazareth, where he is met with skepticism and rejection.



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#### MATTHEW 14:1-21

#### Context

Matthew 14 begins with the story of the execution of John the Baptist by Herod at the request of Herodias, Herod's wife. After hearing about John's death, Jesus withdraws to a solitary place, but crowds follow him. Jesus has compassion on them, teaches them, and then miraculously feeds the crowd of 5,000 with just five loaves of bread and two fish. This passage highlights Jesus's compassion for the people and his ability to perform miracles. The feeding of the 5,000 is a significant miracle that showcases Jesus's authority and divine nature, as well as his willingness to care for the physical and spiritual needs of those who seek him.



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### MATTHEW 14:22-36

#### Context

Continuing in Matthew 14, Jesus sends his disciples away on a boat and goes up to a mountainside to pray. During the night, a storm arises and tosses the disciples' boat. Jesus walks on the water toward them, and Peter attempts to walk on water as well but begins to sink, prompting Jesus to rescue him. After calming the storm, Jesus and the disciples reach the other side of the Sea of Galilee, where Jesus performs more miracles, healing many who are sick.

### MATTHEW 15:1-20

#### Context

Jesus responds by rebuking them for prioritizing human traditions over God's commandments and highlights the importance of honoring God with the heart rather than outward rituals. He teaches that what defiles a person is not external actions, like eating with unwashed hands, but the sinful thoughts and intentions that come from the heart. Jesus shifts the focus from outward rituals to inner purity, emphasizing that true defilement comes from within.

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### MATTHEW 15:21-39

#### Context

In Matthew 15:21-39, Jesus travels to the region of Tyre and Sidon, where he encounters a woman described as a Canaanite. This woman, who is not Jewish, approaches Jesus and pleads for him to heal her daughter. Despite her non-Jewish background, Jesus recognizes her faith and grants her request, highlighting the power of her faith. Following this encounter, Jesus continues his ministry in the region, healing many people and performing various miracles, including feeding a crowd of four thousand with seven loaves of bread and a few fish.



### MATTHEW 16:1-12

### Context

He warns his disciples to beware of the leaven of the Pharisees and Sadducees, referring to their hypocrisy and unbelief. The disciples misunderstand Jesus's warning, thinking he is talking about bread, but Jesus clarifies that he was referring to the teachings and influence of the Pharisees and Sadducees. He encourages them to have faith and remember the miracles and teachings they have witnessed.

### MATTHEW 16:13-28

### Context

Jesus then foretells his own suffering, death, and resurrection, which Peter initially rejects. Jesus rebukes Peter for his lack of understanding and states that anyone who wishes to follow him must deny themselves, take up their cross, and follow him. The chapter concludes with Jesus speaking about the cost of discipleship, the reward of eternal life, and the promise of his second coming in glory to judge the world.

### Context

This event gives the disciples a glimpse of Jesus' divine nature and foreshadows his eventual glorification. Upon descending from the mountain, Jesus heals a boy possessed by a demon whom the disciples were unable to heal. Jesus rebukes the disciples for their lack of faith and demonstrates his authority over evil spirits by casting out the demon and healing the boy. Jesus then foretells his impending betrayal, suffering, and resurrection to his disciples, preparing them for what is to come. He pays the temple tax with a coin retrieved from a fish's mouth, demonstrating his sovereignty and provision.

### MATTHEW 18:1-14

### Context

Jesus goes on to tell the parable of the lost sheep, illustrating God's love for the lost and the joy in heaven over one sinner who repents.

### Context

Jesus begins by urging his followers to address and resolve conflicts in a spirit of reconciliation and forgiveness. He presents a process for dealing with sin within the community, emphasizing the importance of seeking restoration and reconciliation. Through The Parable of the Unforgiving Servant, Jesus teaches the importance of forgiveness and the need to extend grace to others.

### MATTHEW 19

#### Context

In Matthew 19, Jesus engages in discussions about marriage, divorce, and the kingdom of heaven. The chapter opens with Pharisees testing Jesus with questions about divorce, to which he responds by affirming the sanctity of marriage and emphasizing God's original intent for a lifelong union between a man and a woman. Jesus then blesses the children brought to him and teaches that the kingdom of heaven belongs to those who have childlike trust and faith. He challenges a rich young man to give up his possessions and follow him, highlighting the significance of letting go of worldly attachments to enter the kingdom of God. Jesus teaches about the challenges of wealth, asserting that it is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich person to enter the kingdom of heaven. He reassures his disciples that with God, all things are possible. The chapter concludes with Jesus promising rewards for those who give up everything to follow him, and he foretells his impending suffering, death, and resurrection.

### MATTHEW 20:1-19

### Context

This illustrates God's generosity and grace, showing that all who come to him will receive the same reward of eternal life. This section also recounts the account of Jesus predicting his impending crucifixion and resurrection to his disciples for the third time, emphasizing the necessity of his sacrificial death for the redemption of humanity.



He reminds them that greatness in the kingdom is achieved through servanthood and selfless sacrifice. The chapter concludes with a miracle of Jesus, in which he heals two men who are blind.



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

### MATTHEW 21:1-22

### Context

In Matthew 21:1-22, the passage begins with Jesus entering Jerusalem riding on a donkey, fulfilling the prophecy of the Messiah coming in a humble and peaceful manner. Upon entering the temple, Jesus overturns the tables of the money changers and sellers, citing scripture that his house should be a house of prayer. Jesus then curses a fig tree that does not bear fruit, symbolizing judgment on those who profess faith but lack true righteousness. He teaches his disciples about the power of faith and prayer, emphasizing that with faith, they can move mountains and receive whatever they ask for in prayer.

### MATTHEW 21:23-46

In the parable of the Two Sons, Jesus illustrates the importance of genuine repentance and obedience to God. In the parable of the Wicked Tenants, Jesus describes how the tenants mistreat and eventually kill the landowner's servants and son, symbolizing the rejection of God's messengers and the coming judgment. Overall, this passage highlights Jesus's authority as the Son of God and his message about the importance of true repentance, obedience to God, and acceptance of Jesus as the cornerstone of faith. Jesus warns of the consequences of rejecting him and failing to bear spiritual fruit within God's kingdom.

### MATTHEW 22:1-22

### **Context**

Later, the Pharisees and Herodians try to trap Jesus by questioning him about paying taxes to Caesar. Jesus responds in a way that highlights the concept of honoring both earthly authorities and God. Through these teachings, Jesus emphasizes the inclusivity of the kingdom of heaven, the importance of responding to God's invitation, and the necessity of giving proper respect and allegiance to both God and earthly rulers. Jesus highlights the significance of faithfulness to God and living out his kingdom values in all aspects of life.

### MATTHEW 22:23-46

Jesus responds by affirming the importance of loving God with all of one's heart, soul, and mind, and also emphasizes loving one's neighbor as oneself. He states that all the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments.

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### MATTHEW 23

### Context

In Matthew 23, Jesus delivers a series of denunciations against the religious leaders of his time, including the scribes and Pharisees. He confronts their hypocrisy, self-righteousness, and legalistic approach to religion, highlighting the gap between their outward piety and their inward attitudes. This chapter serves as a powerful critique of religious hypocrisy and false spirituality, urging believers to prioritize genuine faith, humility, and righteousness over outward displays of religiosity. Jesus' condemnation of the religious leaders and warning to his followers not to follow their example underscore the importance of sincerity and authenticity in one's relationship with God.

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### MATTHEW 24:1-31

#### Context


In Matthew 24:1-31, Jesus speaks to his disciples about the future, specifically about the destruction of the temple and signs of the end times. He predicts that the temple will be destroyed and warns of false messiahs, wars, and natural disasters that will occur before his return. He describes the signs that will precede his coming and the importance of being watchful and ready for his return. This passage serves as a message of encouragement and warning from Jesus about the signs of the end times, the importance of staying faithful, and the hope of his eventual return to establish his kingdom. It emphasizes the need for readiness and perseverance in the face of coming trials and difficulties.

MATTHEW 24:32-50

### Context

In Matthew 24:32-50, Jesus continues to speak about the signs of his coming and the need for vigilance among his disciples. He uses the analogy of the fig tree to illustrate that, just as its buds signal the coming of summer, the signs of the times will indicate his imminent return. Jesus stresses the importance of being alert and prepared for his coming, comparing it to the unexpected arrival of a thief in the night. He urges his followers to live in a manner that honors God and serves others diligently.

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### MATTHEW 25:1-30

#### Context

Matthew 25 continues Jesus' teachings about the end times and the importance of being prepared for his second coming. This section contains two key parables that convey the message of readiness, faithfulness, and accountability in light of Christ's return. The first parable is the Parable of the Ten Virgins, which highlights the importance of being prepared and watchful for the coming of the bridegroom, representing Jesus. The second parable is the Parable of the Talents, where a master entrusts his servants with talents (a form of currency) before going on a journey. The servants who invest and multiply their talents are commended and rewarded, while the one who buries his talent out of fear incurs the master's displeasure.

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### MATTHEW 25:31-46

#### Context

Matthew 25:31-46 continues with a third parable, the Parable of the Sheep and the Goats, which describes the final judgment where the righteous are separated from the unrighteous based on their deeds of kindness and compassion towards others, with Jesus identifying himself with the needy and marginalized.



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#### MATTHEW 26:1-29

#### Context

In Matthew 26:1-29, the events leading up to Jesus' arrest, trial, and crucifixion are described. The passage begins with the religious leaders plotting to arrest and kill Jesus, and Jesus sharing with his disciples that he will be betrayed and crucified. As Passover approaches, Jesus shares a meal with his disciples, which becomes known as the Last Supper. During the meal, he institutes the sacrament of communion, using bread and wine to symbolize his body and blood, instructing his followers to remember him through this practice. Jesus predicts that one of his disciples will betray him, and Judas Iscariot agrees to betray Jesus for thirty pieces of silver. This betrayal sets in motion the events leading to Jesus' arrest and crucifixion.

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MATTHEW 26:30-56

#### Context

In Matthew 26:30-56, following the Last Supper, Jesus and his disciples go to the Mount of Olives. Jesus tells the disciples that they will all fall away and predicts Peter's denial, but Peter declares that he will never disown Jesus. In the garden of Gethsemane, Jesus prays to God, expressing his anguish and asking if it is possible for the cup of suffering to be taken from him. Judas arrives with a crowd to betray Jesus, and Jesus is arrested. Jesus is taken into custody, fulfilling the prophecy of the Scriptures. The disciples scatter, just as Jesus foretold. This passage demonstrates Jesus' obedience to God's plan, his willingness to suffer for the salvation of humanity, and his prediction of the disciples' eventual return to him after his resurrection.

#### MATTHEW 26:57-75

#### Context


In Matthew 26:57-75, Jesus is brought before the high priest and the Sanhedrin for a mock trial. The high priest accuses Jesus of blasphemy, and the Sanhedrin condemns him to death. Peter, who had followed Jesus to see the outcome, is recognized as one of Jesus' disciples by a servant girl. Three times Peter denies any association with Jesus, fulfilling Jesus' earlier prediction that Peter would deny him three times before the rooster crowed. The passage ends with the rooster crowing, reminding Peter of his denial and prompting his deep remorse and weeping.



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

### MATTHEW 27:1-31

#### Context

In Matthew 27:1-31, after Jesus is condemned by the Sanhedrin, he is taken to Pontius Pilate, the Roman governor, who finds no guilt in him. Despite this, at the insistence of the crowd and the religious leaders, Pilate condemns Jesus to be crucified. Judas Iscariot, who betrayed Jesus, becomes overwhelmed with guilt, returns the thirty pieces of silver to the religious leaders, and then hangs himself. Jesus is mockingly hailed as the "King of the Jews" by the Roman soldiers, who cruelly mistreat him, placing a crown of thorns on his head and mocking him. He is then led away to be crucified.

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MATTHEW 27:32-66

#### Context

In Matthew 27:32-66, Jesus is led to Golgotha, where he is to be crucified. Along the way, Simon of Cyrene is forced to carry Jesus' cross. Jesus is then crucified, along with two criminals. On the cross, Jesus is mocked and taunted by onlookers, soldiers, and one of the criminals, while the other criminal asks Jesus to remember him in his kingdom. Jesus promises the repentant criminal that he will be with him in paradise. There was darkness over the land for three hours from noon, and when Jesus breathed his last breath and died, there was an earthquake, and the curtain of the temple was torn in two – symbolizing the barrier between God and humanity being broken. After Jesus died, Joseph of Arimathea asked for Jesus' body so he could bury it in a new tomb. The tomb is sealed and guarded by Roman soldiers to prevent anyone from stealing the body.

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### MATTHEW 28

#### Context

Matthew 28 recounts the resurrection of Jesus Christ, one of the central events in the Christian faith. The chapter opens with the account of the two Marys visiting the tomb of Jesus and encountering an angel who announces that Jesus has risen from the dead. The women are instructed to inform the disciples and to go to Galilee, where they will see the risen Jesus. The chapter concludes with Jesus meeting his disciples in Galilee, commissioning them to go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey all that he has commanded. Jesus assures them of his presence with them always, even to the end of the age.



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
